Two of the main problems with transport in cities are that it causes congestion and pollution.
Public transport within cities includes buses, trains and trams. Everyone may use it, usually for a fee. The advantages of public transport are that it is a quick way to transport many people at the same time and this reduces congestion and pollution.
The main reasons for travel within the United Kingdom are: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • work or business • shopping • visiting relatives • leisure or tourism.
International transportation involves the movement of people or goods between countries.
Tourism and the trade of goods and services between countries are the main reasons for international transportation.
The Suez Canal connects the Mediterranean Sea with the Red Sea and the Indian Ocean; the Panama Canal –between North and South America – connects the Pacific and Atlantic Oceans.
